Physical Description

- Purebred pygmies should have a short, stocky appearance making them suitable for their intention as a meat or milk goat.
- They have medium length fur and a thick undercoat, which allows them to tolerate even very temperate weather. Pygmy goats come in a wide variety of colors.
- The most common are silver agouti (grey/black mixture), caramel (tan with black markings), and black (with white points).
- Although pygmy goats all grow horns, many are dehorned for safety reasons.

Pygmy goats are very tolerant, pleasant-natured animals. Males have a scent gland near the crown of their heads that releases an odor that attracts females.

Reproduction









Pygmy goats are able to breed as early as two months, it is recommended to wait until they have finished developing at 12-18 months. The female pygmy goat heat cycle is every 18-23 days and can last for three days. Females have a five month gestation period and give birth to one to four kids. Newborn kids will nurse almost immediately, begin eating grain and roughage within a week, and are weaned by three months of age.
